

During the thirty-five-year international maritime business career of classmate Jerry Nelson, he directed company Risk, Loss Prevention & Claims from multiple locations. He also volunteered to serve his communities in the medical or law enforcement areas, as his family and relatives had done.

When Jerry made a business trip to Miami he would visit and ride patrol with FHP Trooper and classmate Jack Weatherly. Jerry served his community in a NJ rescue squad and his National Registry and NJ certified EMT status was helpful, if required. Jerry and Jack enjoyed talking about the great Ribault days.

In 2009 Jerry retired from his international business career and moved to Jacksonville, Florida. He served his community on the Sheriff Advisory Council and Seniors vs. Crime, a project of the Florida Attorney General.

In November 2011 JSO Sheriff John Rutherford awarded Jerry a Certificate of Appreciation in recognition of meritorious service rendered to the Office of the Sheriff and the citizens of Jacksonville. The JSO Zone 6 commander also awarded Jerry a coveted JSO coin reading "Always Ready."

A major case Jerry uncovered was a multi-million-dollar investment scam by a suspect who targeted senior-widowed-church members in multiple states.

Classmate and JSO Officer Ray Godbee and wife attended the ceremony as their JSO daughter received a service award.

In May 2012 the Florida Office of Attorney General awarded Jerry a "Superior Investigator" award for his multiple Seniors vs. Crime civil case resolutions. The project prevents crime and fraud and mediates civil disputes.

Later in 2012 Jerry relocated to Biloxi, Mississippi to be near twin brother Larry and family. To continue serving his community he volunteered to join the Harrison County Sheriff Office (HCSO) as a Deputy. He is now a Sergeant Deputy with over ten years of service.

In May 2020 the Rotary Club of Gulfport, Mississippi named Jerry as the 2020-2021 Safety Deputy for ensuring safety service to the area administration and public of Harrison County. A Certificate of Appreciation was presented at the Great Southern Club.

In February 2024 the Sheriff of Harrison County nominated Jerry as the Deputy of the Quarter to the Gulfport Chamber of Commerce. To summarize the Sheriff's nomination for Jerry's selected award included:

- Long work hours for many years
- Vital role in team task assignments
- Instrumental in covering broad range of details
- Unparalleled dedication to his community and residents
- Honored and blessed his superior leading him as such a true servant

In March 2024 Jerry was nominated for the John & Patty Caranna Service Award in recognition and appreciation for many hours of effort and selfless contributions to the community and volunteer service in Harrison County. He received a Certificate of Award from the TRIAD Group.

Jerry has received numerous work awards from HCSO, community organizations, and law enforcement agencies for his sacrifice, professionalism, and strong moral compass.

While Jerry has enjoyed serving his domiciled communities, he thinks of his Ribault classmates who have had similar experiences. They are the makeup of real America. He

salutes them—primarily the medical and law enforcement classmates that have helped make our society a safe and pleasant place to live.

TWO TRIPS OF A LIFETIME

In mid-April, Bruce and I flew to Honolulu, Hawaii and while there we went to Pearl Harbor. We heard all about the World War II from the Pacific theater and saw the USS Arizona and USS Missouri memorials. Why this is important is because it sets the scene for the next trip.

On May 28th we flew to Washington, DC and then on to London, England. This was also a World War II trip but set in the Europe theater. There were three highlights in London. First was a visit to Bletchley Park Village outside of London. In this location, there were men and women who were intercepting coded messages which were eventually broken. They lived there for years and were known as the code breakers. We also went to Churchills War Room, which was an underground bunker in downtown London. The D-Day museum there tells a different story about WWII in the Pacific minimizing it very effectively. Finally, we toured the Port of Portsmouth. This is a harbor town where many of the ships and landing craft moved from Portsmouth to go to the beaches. While on that excursion, we went to an authentic English pub where Eisenhower, Montgomery and Patton reconnoitered prior to D-Day.

Next, we moved by bullet train (Eurostar) to Paris, France where we boarded a Viking cruise. While in Paris, we saw Notre Dame Cathedral (only built in 1163) which experienced a disastrous fire in 2019. It will reopen to the public in December of this year. We also ate macaroons which were brought to France in 1533. In the Latin Quarter (Paris is made up of 20 quarters, Population 2 million) we saw the walls of a Roman bath. We also were very close to the Eiffel Tower and the Statue of Liberty (which faces west toward the United States).

We moved by boat to Normandy and then went to the American Cemetery. There are approximately 9,000 graves which hold the remains of 23,000 American military. We happened upon the military practicing the posting of the colors and playing taps. Quite moving. There were people everywhere; military, tourists, and history lovers even though the anniversary was still two days away. Then we went down to Omaha Beach and eventually to a German Bunker. A detail that I did not remember from World War II history was that Americans landed at Omaha Beach and Utah Beach, while the English landed at Juno Beach and Gold Beach and the Canadians landed at Sword Beach.

On the ship on the D-Day 80th Anniversary, June 6, 2024, there was a wreath laying ceremony which also honored veterans on the cruise numbering 25 of the 200 passengers.

We next went to a Rouen Farm where they make Apple distilled spirits. Black-faced and black-hooves sheep, beehives, and apple trees figure into the whole farm experience.

A visit to Monet's house and Palace de Versailles finishes out the trip. Sunday June 9th finds us going to the Charles de Gaulle airport past many venues for the 2024 Olympics which is one month away. We flew from Paris into Washington, DC (or across the pond as it is usually referred) and then back to Jacksonville. Even if you aren't that interested in history, it was an awesome trip and a delightful culinary experience.




Doha, Qatar trip January 25-February 29, 2024

I was able to ride a camel for an hour. I have now ridden a horse, elephant and camel. I guess my next adventure will have to be skydiving!!! Just kidding!





I can't remember exactly what year I started the website but I believe it was 1997. I was bored at home being a caregiver for my mom and, together with Ken working out of town, I had nothing else to do. My son Michael was a program tester and suggested I might want to start a class website. I believe the reunion committee, which I was a charter member, was working on planning a reunion [30th]. Michael suggested Homestead Technologies because at that time it was free. Today it is \$100 yearly.

It became an obsession with me. It was easy to use and I began contacting classmates we had not heard from. I tried different sections like the addresses, where our classmates had spread out across the US, etc. I remember a poll for formal or casual dress for a reunion.

Frankie Cribbs began sending me lots of suggestions of things I could do with the website or how to do something, since he was way more experienced with a computer than I was. Larry Waters was also helpful in providing information. Thankfully, as my mother began needing more care in 2006, Frankie was willing to step up and take over. He really expanded it and turned it into a more professional website. I was truly thankful for him. I had really enjoyed every moment of it.

Recently, I was asked to update the website *In Memory* page with all missing dates of death, obituaries, etc. I had expressed a passion in doing genealogy work. Today every deceased member of our class (that we know of) has at the very least, a date of death below their name. I hated to see so many of our classmates with no info on their deaths.

I am a genealogy junky. I love learning about people and their history so I have been doing this for years. I don't call it stalking but usually "hunting dead people." I know more about my ancestors than I do about my living relatives.

First, I start with known facts. Full name (very important). Thankfully they used their proper names in 1967 year book. First stop is Google. Sometimes this is all it takes. But if no luck there, I go to my Ancestry.com account. I use the 1950 census to find parents' names or addresses. Sometimes I can find an obituary for a parent which would give me the name of a married female or where the surviving child lived. Marriage records in *Ancestry* help also. I have had to find spouse obituaries. I rely on *Ancestry* a lot as they have city records by year of where folks live so I could go to North Carolina, for example. Begin looking for property records. *Fold <u>3.com</u>* is a military website and sometimes has enlistment and discharge dates. All of this leads me to the last known area folks may have lived. Then I began to look for death notices in *Find a Grave.com*, *Newspapers.com* and *Family Search*. About 90 percent of the time by now I have the info I am looking for. Sometimes I am stumped. No obituary or any record. I always feel sad that no record is left for a person's life.

My dear friend Alice has asked me to write about my time as Webmaster for the Great Class of '67. When she asked me to do this, I thought to myself, "Well, this is going to be short . . . and boring." But she always did have a way of dragging me into things. I will say most of the time I went willingly. So here I am . . . again! It will be brief.

After our great Webmaster and classmate, Frankie Cribbs, unexpectedly passed away, the Class was left for several months without anyone to manage the site.

Alice and I had several conversations regarding the webmaster opening. I told her that I might be interested but knew nothing about the subject. Alice encouraged me to **JUST DO IT**! In fact, we agreed to be Co-Webmasters. Alice would write to classmates soliciting information. She would write stories about our days in high school, among other things. She would make sure everything would be grammatically correct, punctuation perfect, and, of course, no misspellings. I would take her input and place it on the website, along with photos. Basically I handled the technical side of it. That, by the way, strikes me as hilarious, because I am anything but technical. Seriously!

I remember calling Darlene (reunion committee chairman at the time who was tasked with finding a new webmaster) to tell her that Alice and I wanted the job. We spoke for about an hour. I thought she would be ecstatic. Her search was over! Instead, I'm not certain she shared my enthusiasm. But, nevertheless, no one else stepped forward, so we got the job. OK . . . so now what? Where do I start? I didn't know a thing about websites.

I called Homestead which hosts our website. I was told there was an instruction manual that I could download. That's where I started. There was also a 1-800 number for technical support. After numerous calls, I had it memorized. So, bottom line, under the tutelage of these two methods, I taught myself.

If I had to point to my favorite experience in working with the website, it had to be when we asked for input from classmates and they actually responded. To me that is what made the website interesting. It was in that view that the *Go Ask Alice* page came into being. I just loved it and thought it was so clever. Who else knew the scoop on everyone better than Alice? It was always Alice who knew everything about everybody from way back in the day and still continues to this day. You want to know something? Just go ask Alice. We added the song by Jefferson Airplane entitled *White Rabbit* with the line "go ask Alice when she's ten feet tall," which of course was controversial and caused a little bit of a dust up among a few of the classmates. We asked those classmates not to take it literally (after all, Alice only got to 5'8"). I think we kicked it off with a question about the dead horse on Mary Lee Walker's front porch. That was a good one. Thank you, Tom Brunofsky!

I was webmaster for over 13 year and then decided it was time to move on and let someone else have a go at it. The website was eventually turned over to Debbie. **WOW!!!** The site is so professional looking now. When I pull it up I think, "this could be the website for the City of Jacksonville." It's absolutely beautiful. Well done, Debbie! You go girl!
